# Software Licenses

FOSS licenses stipulate

- What you *may* do (permissions)
  - e.g., copy the code, modify it, re-distribute it
- What you *must* do (obligations)
  - e.g., use the same license, mention author's name

# Attribution Obligation

You have to mention the copyright holder and reproduce the license.

Sometimes only in source; others even if you don't distribute the source

- “Redistributions in binary form must reproduce the above copyright notice, this list of conditions and the following disclaimer in the documentation and/or other materials provided with the distribution.”
  - BSD-3-Clause (and others)

# Attribution Obligation First Look

You have to mention the copyright holder and reproduce the license text.

Seems clear and easy enough.

Generally considered the most easily satisfiable requirement.

# Fulfilling Attribution Obligation

You have to reproduce

- the copyright notice;
- the list of conditions; and
- the disclaimer

in the documentation and/or other materials provided with the distribution.

# Fulfilling Attribution Obligation, per file

“Redistributions in binary form must reproduce the above copyright notice, this list of conditions and the following disclaimer in the documentation and/or other materials provided with the distribution.”

# However...

Typical software packages have tens, hundreds, or thousands of files

Even if a single license is used for all files, what has to be reproduced:

- List of conditions is the same
- So is the disclaimer
- But copyright holders often differ

# Typical example

## OpenSSH-7.3p1

- 249 source files
- 293 copyright notice lines
- 93 different copyright notice lines



# Different Copyright Notices (1)

## Different copyright holders

- 35 different copyright holders
  - \* Copyright (c) 2003 Markus Friedl. All rights reserved.
  - \* Copyright (c) 2003 Jakob Schlyter. All rights reserved.
  - \* Copyright (c) 2003 Markus Friedl. All rights reserved.
  - \* Copyright (c) 2003 Nils Nordman. All rights reserved.
  - \* Copyright (c) 2003 Wesley Griffin. All rights reserved.

# Different Copyright Notices (2)

Differences can be subtler than copyright holders

- 23 different copyright notices for Markus Friedl

- \* Copyright (c) 1999, 2000 Markus Friedl. All rights reserved.
- \* Copyright (c) 1999, 2000, 2001 Markus Friedl. All rights reserved.
- \* Copyright (c) 1999, 2000, 2001, 2002 Markus Friedl. All rights reserved.
  
- \* Copyright (c) 2012 Markus Friedl. All rights reserved.
- \* Copyright (c) 2013 Markus Friedl <markus@openbsd.org>
- \* Copyright (c) 2014 Markus Friedl. All rights reserved.

# Fulfilling Attribution Obligation

You have to reproduce

- the copyright notice;
- the list of conditions; and
- the disclaimer

for *each of the files* in the software package.

# Software Package Data Exchange<sup>®</sup> (SPDX<sup>®</sup>)

Standard format for communicating the components, licenses, and copyrights associated with software packages.

Specific fields for info on each file:

- FileCopyrightText
- LicenseInfoInFile
- LicenseConcluded

# Tricky Copyright Notices

Differences can be even subtler than copyright holders or years

- Are all these notices different? Must the complete line be reproduced?

- \* Copyright \_\_\_\_ Damien Miller
- \* Copyright (c) \_\_\_\_ Damien Miller
- \* Copyright (c) \_\_\_\_ Damien Miller.
- \* Copyright (c) \_\_\_\_ Damien Miller. All rights reserved.
- \* Copyright (c) \_\_\_\_ Damien Miller <djm@mindrot.org>
- \* Copyright (c) \_\_\_\_ Damien Miller <djm@openbsd.org>
- \* Copyright (c) \_\_\_\_ Tatu Ylonen <ylo@cs.hut.fi>, Espoo, Finland

- “Redistributions [...] must reproduce *the above copyright notice* [...]”

# Trickier Cases

# Simplest Compliance Policy

All the issues are automagically resolved, if you simply...

deliver source code!

# Conclusions

- Attribution obligation is considered easily satisfiable
- There are tricky cases
- Caution when trying simplistic approaches
  
- SPDX is the standard format for communicating this info
  
- Simple policy to satisfy the obligation: always deliver source
